a civil society of over 7,000 people from around the world. I feel it is important to get out of Whittier and my own routine of service once in a while and learn

2025 3/10/25 to 3/14/25-CSW69 for Nongovernmental Organizations (NGO's) at the United Nations in New York City-I arrived on a morning flight into Newark, NJ- the sun shining, I could see all the waterways between Washington DC and NYC. Beautiful! I landed and got an Uber to the Evan Hotel-tiny room for two women but so convenient to the United Nations location and the two offsite locations where parallel breakout meetings occurred.



First timer experience at First order of business on Sunday afternoon was going with the Commission on the Dawn Marie Lemonds, past SIA President, my guide for the Status of Women (CSW69). week. We picked up our official badge/lanyard at the US Official Visitors Center to the UN. Keep in mind you need Reason to go: to be a part of your passport and the approved letter from the United Nations that was emailed to you which Soroptimist International (SI) approved. You must apply to be a representative by completing an application and sending it to SI (not SIA!). There was no cost to apply so it is worth it to apply before the deadline to start the process. Once you receive an invitation and get approved, you must give them your passport number and let them know the hotel where you will be staying. There were just over 100 Soroptimists registered for the first week and over 7,000 people registered for CSW69 and the CSWNGO69. The proud people representing their countries wore beautiful dresses and traditional costumes. Each person must go across the street from the UN and stand in line to get your credentials with your picture taken for it. I ran into Dolores Hayes as we left the building and a few Soroptimists we knew including Raelene from SI Westland, New Zealand with her five roommates who rented an apartment for three weeks. We also encountered three others from the Desert Coast Region.



On our first day we chose to attend events at the offsite location and attended a panel discussion which included about 10 female doctors in the medical field dealing with women's health. Each was part of the International Medical Association on women's health issues from birth to grave. A few brought up the fact that doctors don't know everything and that if we feel something seems wrong keep asking questions.

The second session is the one we really wanted to hear, it was a panel of human trafficking survivors and prostitution. Each shared the organization they belong to and how they are making a difference in their country. One from Sweden explained the laws in their country. There was an activist named Jeanette who had also marched in 1969, she was from Kentucky and advocated for changing the laws and insisting that the courts prosecute the predators. Despite the seriousness of the topic and the large number of people being tracked and entering into prostitution because they are poor and have no other opportunities, they were each optimistic that they are making a difference.

The third session of the day was on rights of men and boys and the stereotype and expectations of men. A twist on equal rightsmen have to make money to support the families, they cannot take time off for a sick kid or to care for an elderly parent. There are prejudices in society and it was found that if a boy or young man witnesses abuse in their family that they are more likely to become abusive too.



That afternoon, at another offsite location, we watched a movie that will come out on PBS on May 1, 2025 titled "American Delivery" about the work done in rural areas by midwives and doulas. We learned the maternal death rate during delivery in California was 16% but in 5 years they were able to bring it down by 50%. We saw babies being born and heard of the issues of too many C-sections for the convenience of the doctors and hospitals. The movie highlighted the visiting nurses who went monthly at the beginning of a woman's pregnancy to the patient rather than the patient going to the doctor. At the University of Kentucky Medical Center, the doctors in traditional delivery rooms worked with the midwives when there were complications at birth. One doctor created a Delivery Clinic in order to make the mother-to-be more comfortable with a backup plan with the local hospital if needed.

This is just a day, it is quite overwhelming with all that I learned and attended. So worth the trip and I hope to do it with some of you in the future, maybe in Geneva! Please let me know if you have any questions. Contact Elizabeth Camp, at Eecamp77@gmail.com.

SOROPTIMIST VILLAGE FOUNDATION

Soroptimist Village is a Senior Housing Project in the City of Norwalk that provides affordable housing for seniors aged 62 and older. SI Whittier, in collaboration with five other Soroptimist Clubs from the Desert Coast and Camino Real Regions, makes up the Board of Directors who oversees the Soroptimist Village housing project.

The Village consists of 52 units, including studio and one-bedroom garden apartments, along with a large community room and an industrial-size kitchen used for resident events and gatherings. Since its inception in 1957, Soroptimist Village has served thousands of residents. The City of Norwalk has been a valued partner in referring and placing seniors in these affordable units.

In 2018, a fire destroyed five of the units, which then had to be rebuilt from the ground up. After seven long years- delayed in part by the COVID-19 pandemic, a Certificate of Occupancy was finally issued in April 2025. With great enthusiasm and gratitude, the Board of Directors hosted a Grand Opening and Ribbon Cutting to celebrate the reintroduction of these five units to the rental market, providing homes for five more seniors. The event was an overwhelming success, attended by local dignitaries and over 100 guests.

PROGRAM MEETING NOTES HERE'S A RECAP OF PROGRAM MEETINGS APRIL-JUNE 2025

HIGHLIGHTS

April 8, 2025

Guest speakers were Giselle Fernandez and Ryan Shepherd from the Boys and Girls Club of Whittier & Pico Rivera.

Giselle shared that since **1962**, the **Whittier Area Literacy Council (WALC)**—now part of the **Boys & Girls Club of Whittier**—has provided **free tutoring** to help children succeed in school and empower adults through literacy. This is a year-round program available M-F for 2 hours per week. The students are often 2-3 years behind in literacy. They may come from non-English speaking homes. ESL students are also being served.

Ryan shared that the Boys and Girls Club of Whittier began in 1967 in Whittier and has 42 locations, employing a staff of 460 and serving thousands of students. The Teen Program is very active and works to encourage students' development and leadership skills. Teens can be paid to tutor at WALC. The new model of service is for the Club to function on school campuses instead of having students walking to the club each day. Community mentors are needed especially for the annual Youth of the Year Program.



April 22, 2025 SART @ PIHHealth, 20 YEARS OF PARTNERSHIP

Guests joined us from Forensic Nurse Specialists Inc, PIH support staff and Project Sister. Guest speaker, Malinda Wheeler, RN, MN. FNP provided the impactful report on the past 20 years of our center at PIH Health Hospital. Over her 30 years' experience in the field 28,000 people have been assisted by her company. Sadly, the average number of victims seen each year at PIH Health is between 80 and 100 with the age range being from infant to 94 years. 43% were under 17 years of age, 9% male victims, 3% over 50. Our provision of clothing kits has benefitted 430 women over the years, giving them clean clothes in which to leave the hospital. Due to drugs, alcohol and social media influence the number

of victims has not decreased. Only 1 in 10 victims are brave enough to make a police report and have an exam. Project Sister is a non-profit volunteer organization with advocates on call 24/7 to offer support and follow up for victims when they are called to assist.

April 29, 2025 L.A. ZOO by John Peel

Local resident and friend of our club, John Peel, enjoys a unique position and perspective at the L.A. Zoo. He is both a volunteer and a part-time employee. John is a graduate of CSU Fullerton and UCLA and his vocational career has been in the realm of social services working especially with adoption agencies. In retirement he is fulfilling his dream of working with animals in the capacity of conducting zoo tours and part-time animal keeper. Sharing stories of the animals he is in contact with is his delight and provided a happy afternoon program for all of us!







RECAP OF PROGRAM MEETINGS NOTES

May 13, 2025 CAPC

Guest Speakers Shauna Steele, CEO/Executive Director and Natalie Saenz, Director of Development.

CAPC is a service provider for adults with an intellectual disability. Education and housing are the needs for these clients who have started life with deficits. Some are able to be placed in appropriate housing and employment but some remain dependent for all of life. CAPC empowers individuals with disabilities to live and work on their own and currently is serving 100 people with 300 more on a wait list.





MAY 20, 2025 FIRST DAY HOMELESS SERVICES

Our Guest speaker Ananda Williams, MSW, Program Director at Whittier First Day Homeless Services shared news about the center. She has facilitated the beginning of Group Therapy meetings which are being met with success with the residents.

First Day provides an opportunity for residents to regain their dignity, develop marketable skills, and connect with permanent housing. Residence varies and typically is 1 – 6 months. Help is provided to overcome addiction which affects many of the residents. No alcohol or drugs are allowed within the facility. The temporary housing for women is in a separate area from the temporary housing for men. Their biggest volunteer need is fundraising.

We have recently provided a small grant from our Club's Credit Union Fund.
