

DREAM IT, BE IT at SI Whittier

Dream It Be it has been a successful program at Katherine Edwards Middle located in Whittier California. The program is supported by The Soroptimist International of Whitter and The Boys and Girls Club of Whittier/Pico Rivera. Thanks to this strong partnership, we were able to serve 36 young women between the ages of 10 and 13. The young women are referred to us by the principal of Katherine Edwards, Ms. Tiffany Tagle. Ms. Tagle selects the young women who need additional support due to outside risk factors. The program is run every Tuesday



between the hours of 11:35am-1:15pm for a six-week session. We successfully completed one session and are in progress of a second session. Each session is a mini workshop that embeds social emotional learning and self-discovery. They have really enjoyed the community building games and slime making activities. The young women have shared that they have had a fun experience while participating in the program.

SART...THEN and NOW 2004 – 2024

SIW continues 20 years of supporting abuse survivors through PIH'S Collaborative SART Center

ORIGINS OF **S**exual **A**ssault **R**esponse **T**eam With reflections by Maggie Miller Bernal, September 2024

The SART CENTER at PIH Health Whittier Hospital, SPONSORED BY SIW AND WHITTIER PD, marked a milestone 20 years of service to victims/survivors of rape and sexual assault this past September, 2024.

Well over 20 years ago, approximately in the year 2000, SIW members became aware of a need in our community that involved victims of sexual assault and how their treatment was handled when they were taken to a local emergency room for assessment. The environment was not ideal and the procedures and waiting times were difficult for victims to endure. Then, through conversations between a SIW member and Whittier PD's then-Chief David Singer, a need was identified and an idea presented and SIW was asked if we would consider partnering with WPD and beginning a SART (Sexual Assault Response Team) center at PIH. Our member, Maggie Bernal, presented the idea to our Board of Directors and they were in favor of taking on this challenge, thereafter securing the consent of the club members. At this same time our federation, SIA, was offering \$10,000.00 Grants for worthy community projects. We applied and it was granted and presented to PIH! This allowed the purchase of a special exam table, cameras needed for forensic evidence and other equipment. Subsequently, SIW has provided a continuing supply of clothing kits containing all sizes of sweat pants, sweat shirts, and underwear for these survivors of assault. This service enables assault survivors to leave their other clothing as evidence and be comfortable as they leave the hospital.



We followed an existing model of a SART Center which was already functioning in Long Beach. It involved having specially trained Nurse Practitioners who would be called to assist when a victim entered the ER. This Forensic Nurse Specialist would accompany the victim to a small designated room at the PIH ER so they would not be sitting in the general ER waiting room while waiting for their exam. Additionally, the Forensic Nurse can access immediate patient advocate support from Project Sister where crisis services are offered to women, men and children of all ages who have been sexually assaulted and to their non-offending family members.

After a period of time, an available space was identified within the hospital, not in the ER, and that became the dedicated SART Center which exists today.

"20 years ago, I was blessed to be chosen as President of SIW- there were many exciting years of preparation leading to this important job. Ne'er could I have known that one of my first big community presentations would have been to share the \$10K grant SIW had received to partner with WPD and PIH to create a local SART center. Prior to this, officers were having to transport victims-we now call survivors- to the west side for adequate rape response. The challenges were great, including taking officers (mostly male) off duty for hours at a time to transport and accompany a survivor for often subpar care resulting in decreased likelihood of prosecution/conviction of the offender.

The beauty of SART- despite the difficult work- is having the superior service locally, with continued SIW support in the form of the clothing we provide to survivors after the exam.

This full circle moment occurred last month when I was able to take my new Fellows- training to be peer educators on campusto the SART center. Not only did we meet the medical professionals- nurse and social worker - who provide excellent care, we learned about all aspects of the program and saw all the bags of carefully labeled/sized outfits from SIW- thanks to Karen B... And when I saw this framed certificate on the wall, I just knew I had to share this story..."

Her specialty is Estate Planning and Probate as she enjoys assisting people with issues that greatly affect life circumstances. Topics included were

- Prop. 19 and its effect on Prop 13, also known as the Jarvis Law
- Parent to Child transfers
- · Advice to leave property in a Trust
- Medi Cal Assistance, Medi Cal Recovery. AB 2016 effective 4/1/25 helps lower-income communities and avoids probate if property appraised at less than \$750,000



February 25, 2025 Program featured guest speakers, Deputy Dawn Contreras, LASD Probation Office, and Ruth Delgado, LAX Police Dept. who spoke from the perspective of the Human Trafficking Task Force. The Task Force is said to be a one-stop-shop as many disciplines are encompassed here, i.e. supervising probation officers, CHP, school police, DCFS, Whittier PD and other cities, LAX PD, and the District Attorney's Office.

We were educated, saddened, horrified, and shocked when hearing the facts and scenarios these speakers presented. Those trafficked are found across the entire social spectrum and are easily targeted online through Instagram, Tik Tok, Snapchat, tracking apps, and all social media. A positive note is the passage last September of SB 1414, see www.ca.gov. Look it up!



March 11, 2025 Program Speaker Paymaneh Maghsoudi, Director of Whittier Public Library.

Director Maghsoudi has been with our library since 2001 and presented an amazing overview of this outstanding local resource.
